ASSIGNMENTS

Students will be given assignments and problems on a weekly basis depending on the progress made in class as determined by the number of students participating.

Students shall be graded on their performance in class of the scheduled assignments. Therefore, attendance is mandatory. A student who has more than three unexcused absences shall not be allowed to participate in the final trial and shall receive a failing grade.

The final grade shall be determined by the student's performance at a mock trial before a jury conducted at the end of the semester and class participation during the semester.

Each student shall be required to provide two to three individuals to serve as jurors and one witness for the jury trial at the end of the semester. Also, students will be required to sit as a clerk at one of the trials.

By enrolling in class, students agree to the above terms and conditions of the course.
